It is voluntary and not required for attendance. Individuals desiring to be employed in the equine industry are advised to participate in this evaluation exercise so that we may advise you on your readiness for employment, suggest areas in which you would benefit from further practice and make helpful recommendations to potential employers. A lot of information and skills are crammed into this intensive three day clinic. You are not expected to be "proficient", and we will help you obtain employment suitable to your skill level and will offer advanced classes in coming months where you can further your skills and enhance your advancement potential.)</i></p>
